Class Descriptions

HTR – Introduction to Technical Rescue, Module II

This program meets or exceeds the requirements for NFPA 1006 Standard for Technical Rescue Professional Qualifications, Chapter 5.

Module 2 is a 16-hour introductory classroom and practical course addressing the job performance requirements of NFPA 1006. This course will require basic rescue skills in the low and high angle environments to include site operations; establishment of landing zones for helicopter operations; victim management; rope, knots, and anchoring systems. This course is designed for personnel who will actually serve on or in support of a technical rescue incident. Students will receive a VDFP Certificate of Attendance.

Pre-Course Requirements:

- 1) Students MUST be 18 years of age.
- 2) Successful completion of Virginia Department of Fire Programs Introduction to Technical Rescue, Module I and have it post on your VDFP student transcript.
- 3) Students must be a member in good standing with a recognized fire, EMS, or emergency services agency/department to apply to attend.
- 4) Students shall be psychologically, physically, and medically capable to perform assigned duties and functions at technical search and rescue incidents and to perform training exercises in accordance with of NFPA 1500 Standard on Fire Department Occupational Safety and Health Program, Chapter 10-Medical and Physical Requirements.

HTR – Vehicle Extrication, Operations (Level I)

This program meets or exceeds the requirements for NFPA 1006 Standards for Technical Rescuer Professional Qualification, Chapter 10, Level 1. The students will learn to perform at the Operations Level as specified in NFPA 1670, Standards on Operations and Training for Technical Search and Rescue Incidents, Chapter 8.

This 16 hour program includes classroom and practical training in Common passenger vehicle anatomy, systematic approach to vehicle rescue incidents, common passenger vehicle stabilization, incident hazard isolation, access and egress of common passenger vehicles, disentanglement of victims, the packaging and removal of victims for a common passenger vehicle, and operating as a member of a rescue team and directing rescue operations.

Pre-Course Requirements:

1. Students MUST be 18 years of age.
2. Successful completion of Virginia Department of Fire Programs Introduction to Technical Rescue Module 1 and Module 2 programs.

3. Students must be a member in good standing with a recognized fire, EMS, or public safety agency/department to apply to attend.
4. Students shall be psychologically, physically, and medically capable to perform assigned duties and functions at technical search and rescue incidents and to perform training exercises in accordance with of NFPA 1500 Standard on Fire Department Occupational Safety and Health Program, Chapter 10-Medical and Physical Requirements. Exercises in accordance with the NFPA 1500 *Standard on Fire Department Occupational Safety and Health Program*, Chapter 10-Medical and Physical Requirements.

NFA – Leadership in Supervision: Perspectives in Thinking

This two-day course provides the supervisor with the conceptual foundation and framework for success in leadership roles by exploring creative, analytical, political and critical thinking perspectives. The course addresses skills needed for assessing situations from multiple perspectives, making critical decisions, fostering creativity and innovation, and using persuasion.

Pre-Course Requirements: IS 100, IS 200, IS 700

NFA – Shaping the Future

This is two-day course is designed to assist first- and second-level supervisors and Company Officers (COs) in developing knowledge and skills in contemporary approaches to organizational problem-solving.

Topics include:

- Use of creative approaches to identifying trends within their organizations.
- Applying problem-solving methodologies.
- The importance and application of continuous improvement within organizations.
- How to quantify problems and solutions.
- Factors in organizational and individual resistance to change.
- Strategies for implementing change.

The course incorporates facilitated, student-centered methodologies, including lecture, small and large group activities, and individual assessments.

Pre-Course Requirements: IS 100, IS 200, IS 700

Basic Pump Operator

The Virginia Department of Fire Programs' Basic Pump Operations training program consists of 4 hours of classroom instruction and 12 hours of practical evolutions. The Virginia Department of Fire Programs' Basic Pump Operations training program educates students through classroom instruction as well as hands on practical evolutions. The classroom instruction and props are designed to prepare the firefighter for basic pump operations. To ensure Basic Pump Operations students meet the Virginia Department of Fire Programs program expectations, students must complete the program's practical exercises.

PRE-COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Equipment Required: Helmet, Gloves and Safety Footwear minimum.

Emergency Vehicle Operations Course (Class I, II and III)

The Emergency Vehicle Operator's Course contains eight (8) hours of student lectures and eight (8) hours of driving practical applications. Each student is responsible to participate in all the cone course stations and road course driving in the program and complete the skills to the satisfaction of the instructors.

The sixteen (16) hour **Emergency Vehicle Operator's Course** is a Certificate of Completion training program, designed to meet the Virginia Department of Fire Program training needs as approved by the Virginia Fire Services Board and the Virginia Association of Volunteer Rescue Squads, Inc. The Emergency Vehicle Operator's Course requires that all candidates attend one hundred percent (100%) of the sixteen (16) hour curriculum. ***Candidates should ensure they are able to comply with the course schedule prior to registration.*** **Emergency Vehicle Operator's Course** Candidates failing to attend one hundred percent (100%) of the scheduled training program in sequential order will not be eligible to participate in the testing process.

VDFP/VAVRS requires documented evidence of one hundred percent (100%) attendance at all **Emergency Vehicle Operator's Course** training program sessions before allowing candidates to test.

NAEMT Tactical Emergency Casualty Care (TECC)

The 2nd edition of NAEMT's Tactical Emergency Casualty Care (TECC) course teaches EMS practitioners and other prehospital providers how to respond to and care for patients in a civilian tactical environment.

The course presents the three phases of tactical care and integrates parallel EMS nomenclature:

- Hot Zone/Direct Threat Care that is rendered while under attack or in adverse conditions.
- Warm Zone/Indirect Threat Care that is rendered while the threat has been suppressed but may resurface at any point.
- Cold Zone/Evacuation Care that is rendered while the casualty is being evacuated from the incident site.

The 16-hour classroom course includes all new patient simulations and covers the following topics:

- Hemorrhage control including immediate action drills for tourniquet application throughout the course;
- Complete coverage of the MARCH assessment;
- Surgical airway control and needle decompression;
- Strategies for treating wounded responders in threatening environments;
- Caring for pediatric patients;
- Techniques for dragging and carrying victims to safety; and
- A final, mass-casualty/active shooter event simulation.

NAEMT's TECC course is endorsed by the American College of Surgeons Committee on Trauma, is consistent with the current guidelines established by the **Committee on TECC (Co-TECC)**, and meets all of the updated **National Tactical Emergency Medical Support Competency Domains**. This course is accredited by CAPCE for 16 hours of continuing education credit, and recognized by NREMT.

NAEMT is a **recognized education partner** of the Co-TECC. The Co-TECC establishes guidelines for the provision of prehospital care to injured patients during a tactical incident. The Co-TECC neither creates curriculum for the prehospital provider, nor does it endorse the curriculum of other organizations.

Pre-Course Requirements: Students need to be affiliated with a Fire/EMS, Police Agency or Military. Students should be in good physical condition. Student should be able to lift/carry without restrictions and move in a tactical environment.

Equipment Needed: Knee pads. If the student has tactical gear including vest, helmet, ear and eye pro they can use. Students will be provided equipment if they do not have any.

Total Hours: Class will be 16 hours. Class starts at 8am to 5pm both days.

Maximum Enrollment: 18 students. Each student will receive an NAEMT TECC Certificate once they complete the course and 16 hours VAOEMS CE's for VA EMT level certification or higher.

The mission of this program is to provide Chief Officers, Company Officers and volunteer membership within the fire/rescue delivery system with information, education, services and representation to enhance their professionalism and capabilities.

Total Hours: Class will be 16 hours.

Instructor Train-the-Trainer Programs

Emergency Vehicle Operator Course – Train-the-Trainer – Friday, November 1st from 6pm to 10 pm and November 2nd-3rd, 2019

Description: A 20 hour course to teach those interested in presenting the VDFP EVOC program throughout the Commonwealth. The candidate will be provided classroom presentation on the key points of delivery and will be required to conduct “teach back” on parts of the EVOC program. Candidates will be provided proper practical skill set up and will be required to set several courses up for evaluation by the trainer.

Prerequisites: Fire Instructor I, EVOC Levels I-III. Candidates will need to schedule and successful pass the pre-test from the Division office by the deadline for registration. The test questions are taken from the EVOC program.

Equip. Req: Safety footwear, long pants and ANSI Class III vest.

Hours: 20

Maximum Enrollment: 24 candidates

NFPA-1403 Live Fire Instructor Training – November 2, 2019

Description: .This program is to update and/or provide those instructors that are going to conducting live fire training with the requirements of the NFPA Standard as well as the policies of VDFP. The program has been developed to replace the VDFP Compliance Officer program and will be required for all instructors.

Prerequisites: Current Instructor I or higher

Equipment Required: None.

Hours: 16

Maximum Enrollment: 24 candidates

Test Administration and Skill Evaluation – November 3, 2019

Description: A course designed to cover all elements of the testing of the certification programs offered by VDFP. The class will allow all participants to understand the testing methodology used for accredited program testing. This will qualify those interested in assisting with written test administration and skill evaluations.

Prerequisites: Current Instructor I or higher
